Course Description and Expectations

This credit/non-credit or letter-grade continuing education graduate course is made possible through the Eccles Foundation, Crawford Foundation and the University of Utah Reading Clinic. It is designed to help educators develop advanced theoretical and practical knowledge of effective intervention for students with severe reading difficulties. Specific instructional techniques used in this practicum are grounded in cognitive research on the development of the ability to read words and research on effective instructional practices for students with severe reading difficulties.

During this practicum, participants focus on advanced word study, spelling skills, and application of fluent reading and comprehension of progressively more complex text. This practicum is one of the four components required to obtain Level II Certification. The practicum requires successful delivery of a minimum of 50 lessons starting at Substep 7.1 in accordance with the WRS Steps 7-12 Practicum Study Guide with an approved student, and submission of at least three videotaped lessons for observation and feedback. Participants are expected to:

- administer pre- and post-assessments to identify an appropriate student and measure growth,
- appropriately pace a student through the upper-steps of the WRS curriculum,
- accurately teach the structure of the English language (presented in WRS Steps 7-12), and,
- enhance instructional skills developed in Level I Certification
- The student must receive instruction in three 60-minute or two 75–90-minute lessons per week (at minimum)
- Practicum student must reach Substep 10.3 (or higher) of the program.

Participants will receive extensive mentoring as they apply these techniques in a 1:1 tutorial setting.

NOTE: Successful completion of both this course and WRS® Advanced Word Study Online Course will result in WRS Steps 7-12 Certification. Wilson Reading System® Level II Certification will result after successful completion of WRS Steps 7-12 Certification and WRS Group Mastery Certification. Wilson is a nationally-recognized program that prepares teachers to succeed with students who require intensive instruction.

Assessment of Direct, Multisensory Teaching / Lesson Procedures will be scored as procedures are observed. **Participant must score 3 or higher for all items** on observation form by the final observation. For reference, see WRS Steps 7-12 Practicum / Participant Study Guide.

Observation and Feedback

• **Three videotaped lessons** must be submitted to trainer for review and feedback. Each block of the lesson should be no longer than 30 minutes. (**Note:** After the first three video-recorded submissions (Observations 1-3), participants may be requested to submit an additional video if lesson procedures and instructional components do not yet meet the standards. If skills are not properly demonstrated after four total video-recorded lessons, participant must restart the practicum.)

Advanced Word Study Online Course (Steps 7-12) Descriptions and Expectations

This 55-hour credit/non-credit or letter-grade graduate on-line course (lab) provides instruction in advanced concepts of decoding and encoding to effectively use multisensory techniques to teach more complicated structures of the English language. The Advanced Word Study course is aligned with the systematic sequence of Wilson Reading System® Steps 7-12 including spelling option procedures, contractions, word elements (affixes, Latin and Greek bases) and the following syllable types: r-- controlled, vowel digraph/diphthong. Detailed instruction is provided for each of the substeps through video demonstrations, animations, text, printable materials and assessments.

WRS Steps 7-12 Completion Requirements

- Submit a pretesting report, including educational history and current test results of practicum student.
- Practicum student approval.
- Delivery of a minimum of 50 full 1:1 WRS Lessons, starting at WRS Substep 7.1
- All WRS Steps 7-12 Practica started after August 2020 instruction must be delivered using WRS 4th Edition.
- Provide documentation of written lesson plans.
- Submit a minimum of three videotaped lessons submitted for review and feedback. The final observation must be successfully passed.
- Demonstrate proficiency in implementing all WRS procedures.
- Develop teacher (including lesson plans, assessments, and ongoing progress monitoring) and student notebooks with students written work and progress monitoring in accordance with WLT program standards.
- Demonstrate mastery of lesson plan procedures with an emphasis on both accuracy and fluency for the upper-steps of the program (documented and approved by Wilson Trainer).
- Demonstrate an understanding of advanced language concepts through accurate teaching with multisensory procedures.
- Demonstrate student success and mastery of decoding, encoding, morphology, vocabulary and comprehension skills.
- Conduct posttest assessment and submit WRS Steps 7-12 Practicum Student Final Report, WRS 7-12 Proficiency Exam, and related documents after a minimum of 50 lessons and achievement of WRS Step 10.3 or above.
- Finish the WRS Advanced Word Study Steps 7- 12 online course.

WRS Steps 7-12 Observations and Feedback

- Upload three videotaped observation lessons (at Wilson Academy) for Trainer to review and provide feedback (trainer may request an additional video). Each observation lesson must be a full WRS lesson (all three blocks) and delivered in accordance with the WRS Steps 7-12 Practicum/Participant Study Guide. Submit all required documentation to trainer within two weeks of recording (lesson occurrence). Video recordings and/or required documentation older than two weeks **may not be reviewed**, and participant will be required to submit a new video and documentation of a more recent lesson.
- **Video 1** must show:
 - Show an accuracy lesson taught within the **first 20 practicum lessons and between WRS Substeps 7.1-7.5**.
 - Demonstrate **all three blocks** of a WRS Lesson as indicated on the Video Submission Checklist for Observation #1.
- **Video 2** must show:
 - Show an accuracy lesson taught between **WRS Substeps 8.2-9.7**.
 - Demonstrate **all three blocks** of the lesson plan as indicated on the Video Submission Checklist for Observation #2.

- **Video 3** must show:
 - o Show an accuracy lesson taught at **WRS Substep 10.3 or higher**.
 - o Demonstrate **all three blocks** of the lesson plan as indicated on the Video Submission Checklist for Observation #3.
- With each video submission, include the appropriate Video Submission Checklist. Ensure that all items on the checklist are included (and in order) when submitting observation materials to trainer for review.
- Incorporate trainer feedback from the WRS Steps 7-12 Practicum Observation Form into your remaining practicum lessons and stay in touch with your trainer between observations.

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Credit and Certification

To attain University of Utah credit and to be recommended for Wilson Level II, Step 7-12 certification, participant must demonstrate proficiency in lesson procedures, each criterion outlined below and must earn a score of 3 or higher by no later than the final observation. The participant also must receive a grade of 80% or higher for each online assessment. These assessments are self-paced. Once an assessment has been submitted electronically, responses cannot be changed. In addition, the participant must complete and submit an at-home, open-book proficiency exam with final practicum paperwork.

Certification: Letter Grade

Case Study Guidelines: Intensive Intervention for Students with Severe Difficulties

If you are taking the course for **letter grade** the student you tutored during the practicum will serve as the subject for a **written case study**. The case study should include:

1. Summary and analysis of the student's reading abilities at baseline.

This is more than simply "reporting the data." Briefly describe the student's educational history. Then, describe the student's baseline reading abilities in both table and narrative form by drawing on data collected from standardized and performance-based measures: reading achievement (i.e., Woodcock Reading Mastery Test, Woodcock Johnson-R, Woodcock Johnson 3, or Wechsler Individual Achievement Test), accuracy with letter-sound correspondences, word reading for all syllable types, and word reading and spelling for high frequency words (i.e., WIST), and word recognition and phonemic segmentation fluency (i.e., TOWRE). In addition, you must discuss the student's abilities in relation to chronological grade level. Specifically, at baseline, where is this child in relation to where s/he should be? Why?

2. Summary and analysis of the intervention.

Describe the intervention you provided for this child. Briefly describe each component: decoding (accuracy & fluency), encoding (decoding & fluency), vocabulary, high frequency word work, comprehension work. Did any component seem to offer more difficulty or ease than others? Why? What, if any, adjustments did you make in the intervention?

3. Summary and analysis of the student's reading abilities at posttest.

After administering the posttest and analyzing the data, describe your student's reading abilities at the close of the intervention in both table and narrative form. Discuss your student's posttest performance on the same standardized and performance-based measures administered at baseline. If indicated, make specific recommendations for future intervention.

4. Summary and analysis of your own practice.

As a reading educator, what have you learned from this practicum experience about reading development, assessment, and intervention as they relate to students with severe reading difficulties? How has this knowledge informed your practice? Provide specific examples.

This case study must be typed, double-spaced, and **must** include the following information:

- your full name
- semester and year you registered for the course
- course name, course number, section number (e.g., Wilson II, EDU 6637-040)
- your employing school and district (e.g., Sandy Elementary, Canyons School District)

This information may be placed on page 1; a separate cover page is not necessary.

This case study must be typed and double-spaced. It should be no longer than 10 pages in length. It must meet APA standards for writing style and mechanics. As such, students are encouraged to have their papers proofread for appropriate grammar, spelling, and punctuation.

Your case study is due by 5pm, one week after the last day of practicum and should be sent electronically to kathleen.brown@utah.edu. If needed, you will receive feedback from Dr. Brown electronically.

Case Study Grading Rubric: The case study will earn pass +, pass, pass -, or fail.

The criteria for grading are as follows:

Pass + = Exceptionally strong summary and analysis of baseline results, intervention, and posttest results. Exceptional analysis of practicum's impact on own teaching. Superior academic writing style. No mechanical errors.

Pass = Satisfactory summary and analysis of baseline results, intervention, and posttest results. Satisfactory analysis of practicum's impact on own teaching. Satisfactory academic writing style. Very few, if any, mechanical errors.

Pass - = Less than satisfactory summary and analysis of baseline results, intervention, and posttest results. Less than satisfactory analysis of practicum's impact on own teaching. Flawed academic writing style. Numerous mechanical errors.

It is important to note that failure to meet any criterion constitutes grounds for an assignment to earn a lower score. For example, a case report that is satisfactory in meeting the first three criteria but evidences numerous mechanical errors may earn "pass -."

Case Study Grading Conversions: Pass + = 4.0-3.7(A to A-)

Pass = 3.3-2.0 (B+ to C)

Pass - = 1.7-.7(C- to D-)

We recommend that you keep a copy of your case study on file or hard drive until you receive your final grade.

Please note that we do not make special arrangements to post final grades early.

If you miss the deadline for paper submission, you will receive an "I" signifying "incomplete." After 1 year, the "I" will convert to an "E," which is a final grade of "no credit."
